The Cancer Support Community Announces new Registry Detailing Prostate Cancer Experience

WASHINGTON – (Aug. 18, 2015) –The Cancer Support Community (CSC), an international nonprofit dedicated to providing support, education and hope to people impacted by cancer, announced today a new Registry specifically for men who have or have had prostate cancer. This addition to CSC's Cancer Experience Registry will explore the full experience of prostate cancer — which one in seven men are diagnosed with in their lifetime.

"The Cancer Experience Registry: Prostate Cancer is a chance for men who have experienced prostate cancer to give back to others going through a similar experience," said Gwen Darien, Executive Vice President of Programs and Services at CSC. "We are eager to learn more about the unique needs of this group so that we and others can create resources tailored specifically to men with prostate cancer and their loved ones."

The Cancer Support Community introduced the Cancer Experience Registry as a way to give a voice to people living with cancer and to convey the specific emotional, financial and social impacts of living with cancer to the cancer community at large. The Cancer Experience Registry: Prostate Cancer is the tenth in a series of specialty Registries reaching into specific cancer types. In addition to the Cancer Experience Registry, which is open to anyone with any type of cancer, there are Registries for patients with breast cancer, metastatic breast cancer, multiple myeloma, chronic myeloid leukemia, chronic lymphocytic leukemia, lung cancer and melanoma. Caregivers are also invited to participate by joining the Cancer Experience Registry: Caregivers.

"We're proud to have provided an educational grant to CSC to support the development of a prostate cancer experience registry as part of our shared commitment to patient care," said Tracy McGowan, Strategic Lead, Oncology, Janssen Scientific Affairs, LLC. "Findings from this registry will help the medical community gain a better understanding of patient needs unique to prostate cancer and potential ways to improve treatment approaches and the overall patient experience."
