

A FIVE YEAR REVIEW OF AN EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM FOCUSED ON MEETING THE NEEDS OF ADVANCED BREAST CANCER PATIENTS

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Program Rationale

Women living with advanced breast cancer (ABC) have distinct and often unmet needs, even compared to other women with breast cancer. For the past five years, the Cancer Support Community (CSC) has been committed to delivering Frankly Speaking About Cancer: Advanced Breast Cancer, a comprehensive psychosocial education program created for women with metastatic breast cancer and their families. The workshop provides valuable information about current treatments, clinical trials, side-effect management, and social and emotional challenges of an advanced breast cancer diagnosis. Workshop outcomes are analyzed annually, informing program content and ensuring the program is meeting the needs of those served. As the program enters its sixth year, data were consolidated across the past five years to investigate how the program has been meeting the needs of these women and their loved ones.

Program Context & Content

Frankly Speaking About Cancer: Advanced Breast Cancer, launched in 2006, is part of the Frankly Speaking About Cancer (FSAC) series of programs developed by the CSC.



FSAC programs provides in-depth coverage of topics of relevance to those affected by cancer, guided by the Patient Empowerment concept, that are often not otherwise available in a comprehensive format.

FSAC program materials, representing the most up-to-date content, include:

- · Web-based materials
- Booklets
- · Online radio series and podcasts
- Professionally-led workshops held across the country

This program's clinically facilitated evidence-based education workshops have reached 2,690 attendees attending 150 workshops in over 25 states since its inception in 2006.

FSAC Advanced Breast Cancer program attendees were invited to complete an onsite post-workshop evaluation. 1,827 workshop attendees since the program's beginning have completed evaluations (68% response rate). Results from the attendee evaluation are presented.

Workshop Evaluation

Evaluations addressed:

- · Demographics and cancer history
- Satisfaction with workshop
- Pre/post-workshop knowledge about ABC
- Concerns and experiences of workshop participants related to advanced breast cancer
- Empowerment and patient/provider communication: Workshop participants rated on a 5-point scale (strongly disagree to strongly agree) whether, as a result of attending the workshop, they plan to:
 - · Increase communication with healthcare team
 - · Discuss side-effects/ ask questions to healthcare team
 - · Ask about clinical trials

Respondent Characteristics (n= 1,827)

- 78.5% were Caucasian
- 4.1% were African-American; 8.2% were Hispanic
- Average age was 56.0 years (s.d.=12.6 years)
- Respondents included:
 - Individuals with advanced breast cancer (64.9%)
 - Family members (6.7%)
- Spouse/ partner (11.7%)
- Health care professionals (9.9%)
- Other (6.5%)
- 19.3% received ABC diagnosis within the past year

Workshop Satisfaction

Overall, attendees reported that they were very satisfied with the workshop. Nearly all participants (98.3%) reported they would recommend the workshop to others affected by advanced breast cancer. Examples of feedback include:




What was the most valuable aspect of the workshop for you? (n =372)



Change in Knowledge

Respondents rated their level of knowledge of advanced breast cancer on a 5-point scale. Workshop participants reported a significant gain in knowledge about the workshop topic, post-workshop compared to pre-workshop levels (F= 76.7, p <.01). Most workshop respondents (83.8%) reported gaining a high or very high level of knowledge about advanced breast cancer, with significant increases compared with pre-workshop levels (p <.01).

Changes in Knowledge about Advanced Breast Cancer




Communication

Participants were asked, "As a result of this workshop, do you... a) "feel comfortable speaking with your healthcare team about treatment side-effects?"; b) "have a better idea of what questions to ask your healthcare team?" Most workshop attendees reported increased self-efficacy in:

- Asking questions to their healthcare team (88.6%)
- Discussing side effects of their cancer treatment with their doctors (85.7%), a key issue in regards to quality of life


Communication-Related Workshop Outcomes



Clinical Trial Participation

Most participants (69.6%) reported planning to discuss possible clinical trial options with their healthcare team.

Summary

- Most attendees reported gaining knowledge from attending the workshop and recommend that others affected by advanced breast cancer attend the workshop.
- Large gains were seen in the critical role of being an active participant with one's healthcare team.
- Most attendees intend to increase and more effectively utilize communication with their clinical team following the workshop.
- Data indicate the continued relevance of this program for those affected by advanced breast cancer.

A 5-year review of an educational program focused on meeting the needs of patients with advanced breast cancer

Methods: 1,827 workshop attendees since the program's beginning have completed evaluations (68% response rate) which included assessing levels of pre- and post-workshop knowledge about advanced breast cancer, patient-provider communication, and general workshop feedback.

Results: 64.9% of respondents were survivors, 78.5% were Caucasian, and the average age was 56. Most workshop respondents (89.6%) reported gaining a high or very high level of knowledge about advanced breast cancer, with significant increases compared with pre-workshop levels (p <.01). Most reported intent to increase communication with their clinical team following the workshop. A majority reported feeling better equipped to ask questions to their health care team (92.1%), and discuss the possibility of clinical trials with their healthcare team (77.7%). Furthermore, 90% of attendees felt confident that after the workshop they could speak knowledgably about side effects of cancer treatment with their doctor, a key issue in regards to quality of life.

Conclusions: Taken together, the data indicate the continued relevance of this program for those affected by advanced breast cancer.
